Participating in your local council's election is one of the most direct ways you can make a difference to everyday life in your community, and voting is open to a wider range of people than State and Federal elections. Even if

you are not an Australian citizen, and/or not on the State electoral roll, you can vote in a council election as long as you are over the age of 18 and have lived in the council area their local community. for more than one month.

you own a rateable property in the area (regardless of whether you live in it) or You can nominate for a position on council represent a body corporate (business/ organisation) or a group.

The important thing is to make sure you put your vote in. Unlike the State and Federal Elections, Local Government Elections are not compulsory. Therefore it is up to you to make sure you are enrolled to vote. It is as easy as filling out an application form which can be obtained from our website www.pirie.sa.gov.au, and submitted by 5pm Friday 10 August 2018.

G REGISTRATIONS

From 1 July 2018, Dogs and Cats Online (DACO) will be the central database for microchipped and registered logs and cats and registration payments. Dogs and Cats Online will also be the register of breeders.

Existing dog owners should receive a renewal notice in the mail during July 2018 with their dog's new lifetime registration disc (replacing the annual disc) and instructions on how to complete their annual dog registration on Dogs and Cats Online. If you do not receive a renewal notice for your dog, please contact your council.

This new online service is launching to streamline breeder registration, your pet's microchip data and even your council dog (or cat) registration payments. DACO is a new one-stop website that brings together all your dog and cat management needs in one place.

Here you can pay council registration, register or renew as a breeder and instantly update your details if you move house or change phone numbers.

Approved breeder associations will handle breeder registration in DACO, on behalf of their members. Other breeders will be able to log into DACO and selfmanage their breeder registration within their animal owner profile.

DACO will be the central point for all your dog and cat management payments and information, replacing the 68 individual council systems and private microchip databases currently in place. It will streamline the process for councils, vets and animal welfare agencies too, giving these organisations instant access to information from around the state. This will help them reunite you and your lost dog or cat quicker.

There will now only be two categories to which your dog can be registered under:

- Standard Dog: A dog that is both desexed and microchipped
- Non-standard Dog: all other dogs, even if they are exempt from rules around desexing or microchipping, such as dogs belonging to registered breeders, working livestock dogs etc

Aged pensioners and other concession card holders will also be able to obtain pensioner discounts online. They will no longer need to travel to their council chambers, top pay their registration fees.

Discounted microchipping days are offered throughout the state at various times of the year. Visit dogandcatboard.com.au or chipblitz.com for more details.

The Heritage Rail Trail and the Steamtowr Heritage Rail Centre have been rated among the Top 10 experiences for visitors to South Australia. With a \$2000 dollar fuel card up for grabs, this Peterborough and the outposts along the Heritage began in Broken Hill.

The Heritage Rail Trail begins in the red dirt of Broken Hill and ends at the gulf waters of Port Pirie - a 400km legacy of the world's most profitable stretch of railway. The Trail was completed in 1887 and decommissioned in 1970. It stopped at 15 towns, including the once-mighty steam heartland that was Peterborough. The trail portrays the parched outback plains, hillside pastures and the glittering waters of Port Pirie on the Spencer Gulf.

The stories of the players, the power-brokers and the advent of the world's largest mining company are told via a digital mobile guide as visitors follow the relic of the little 3'6" railway line. This digital guide, through Daytrippa, is free to download via Google or the Heritage Rail Trail site.


