Do you get Holds Notices by Mail?

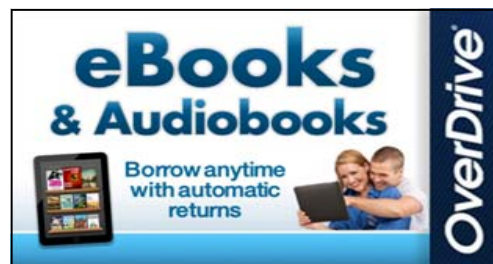

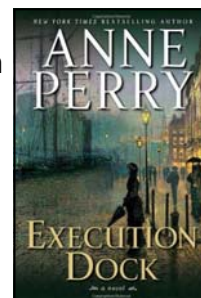

■What's it about?

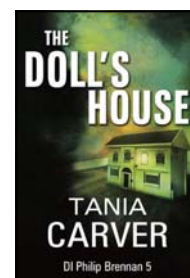
A forensic thriller. The main character, Dr Bill Brockton, is head of the University of Tennessee's forensic anthropology program and of the world-famous Body Farm—a small piece of land where corpses are left to decay in order to gain important forensic information.

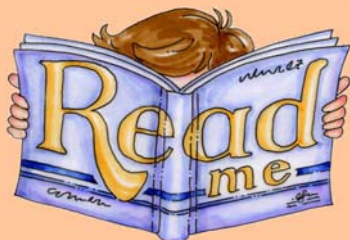

Book Review Rocky River 'Riters

The Secret River By Kate Grenville

Secret River is a novel set in colonial Australia which provides a unique dimension of an era much favoured by writers. It tells the story of William Thornhill and his family.

Out of desperation, William steals to provide for his family and is later sentenced to transportation to Australia. As the Thornhills bravely face the future with newly acquired land, the story unfolds with William developing a degree of understanding and some respect for the first inhabitants. William is disgusted with the behaviour of the neighbours and their treatment of the Aboriginal families. Choices are made which impacts all later in life. Were these the right choices and what could have been done differently?

This book is a beautifully written novel that successfully recreates conditions and challenges faced by early colonists who faced hostile conditions in early Australia. The book is a rich description of their early days in Sydney and the Hawkesbury River region.

The secret river is also available on DVD.

Follow the story of William and his family in the sequel, *Sarah Thornhill*.

Sarah is the youngest child of William and Sal Thornhill. Unknown to her, her father--an uneducated ex-convict from London--has built his fortune on the blood of Aboriginal people. With a fine stone house and plenty of money, Thornhill has re-invented himself. As he tells his daughter, he never looks back, and Sarah grows up learning not to ask about the past.
